

**Purpose or recommendation** 

To provide an overview of provisional outcomes for Wolverhampton schools' 2018 results at the end of each Key Stage, including comparisons with national, regional and statistical neighbours where information is available.

#### **Early Years Foundation Stage Profile**

- 69% of pupils achieved a Good Level of Development (GLD) this marks an increase of 3% on 2017 outcomes. National outcomes indicate that 72% of pupils achieved GLD an increase of 1% on 2017. The positive impact of the Local Authority's Early Years Teacher Advisor is visible in this data.
- In 2018 Wolverhampton is ranked 125<sup>th</sup> (of 152 Local Authorities), this indicates improvement from 140<sup>th</sup> in 2017.
- The gap between Wolverhampton children and national has decreased from 7% in 2016 to 3% in 2018.
- Fewer boys attained GLD than girls (62.3% compared to 75.7%), this was lower than their counterparts nationally resulting in a greater gender gap.
- The greatest differences are visible in the early learning goals (ELGs) were seen in writing and expressive art and design with the smallest gap in mathematics.
- Of the 70 schools with EYFS results in 2018, 32 schools achieved above national outcomes.
- When compared to statistical neighbours Wolverhampton (69%) is above the average, 4<sup>th</sup> in the group, behind Southampton (71%), Sheffield and Derby (both 70%).
- Regional comparisons place Wolverhampton as 7<sup>th</sup> out of 14, with GLD just below the regional average of 70%.



In the city, 62% of pupils eligible for Free School Meals achieved a GLD, this is a
noticeable increase compared to 54% in 2017 and considerably higher than the
national of 57%. This places Wolverhampton 21<sup>st</sup> nationally with a Quartile banding of A
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- and in 1<sup>st</sup> place in comparison to our statistical neighbours and joint 1<sup>st</sup> regionally (with Solihull).
- 65% of pupils with English as an additional language achieved GLD compared to 61% in 2017. This places Wolverhampton 2<sup>nd</sup> in comparison to our statistical neighbours and 3<sup>rd</sup> regionally, this is a 2 % above the West Midlands average.
- 23% of pupils with SEND achieved a GLD which places the city 2<sup>nd</sup> in comparison to our statistical neighbours and regionally; this reflects an increase of 16% in 2017. For children without SEND GLD was 75% in 2018, increasing from 72% in 2017.

#### **Phonics screening test**

- 82% of pupils achieved the expected level in the phonics screening in 2018. This is an increase of 3% on 2017 results whilst nationally there was a 1% increase with 82% of pupils passing the phonics screening. The improvement in outcomes resulted in Wolverhampton ranked 76<sup>th</sup> nationally, compared to 112 in 2017.
- There remains a gap of approximately 8% between boys and girls in this measure.
- 40% of children with SEND (89% for those with no SEN) reached the standard of the phonics screening.
- There is approximately 1% gap in the outcomes for children who have English as their first language and those with English as their second language.
- Pupils eligible for FSM performed particularly well with 74% achieving the expected standard in Phonics, 4% higher than their counterparts nationally, placing Wolverhampton 2<sup>nd</sup> in comparison to our statistical neighbours and joint 3<sup>rd</sup> regionally. This gives Wolverhampton a national ranking of 27 and a quartile banding of A.


#### Key Stage 1

- Reading, Writing and Maths combined (RWM) attainment: 65% of Wolverhampton pupils reached the expected standard in all three subjects, this reflects an increase from 62% in 2017 and 57% in 2016. Proxy national (NCER) outcomes indicate that 65% of pupils nationally attained this level, an increase from 64% in 2017 and 60% in 2016.
- Reading: 74% of pupils achieved the expected standard or above in reading, a 1% increase on 2017 outcomes and compares to 75% nationally. This places Wolverhampton in 96<sup>th</sup> position nationally compared to 107<sup>th</sup> in 2017.
- Writing: 69% of pupils were assessed to be working at the expected standard or above in writing, this is a 3% increase on the previous year and compares to 70% nationally.
   As a result, Wolverhampton is now ranked in 82<sup>nd</sup> position compared to 101<sup>st</sup> in 2017.
- Mathematics: 75% of pupils achieved the expected standard or above, a 1% increase on 2017 outcomes. And compares to 76% nationally. This places Wolverhampton in 89<sup>th</sup> position compared to 96<sup>th</sup> in 2017.
- There was an increase in the proportion of children working at greater depth (GDS), in 2018 this was 23% in reading, 15% in writing and 20% in maths, compared to 26%, 16% and 22% nationally. Overall 11% of pupils in the city attained GDS in all three subjects compared to 12% nationally (NCER).
- In all Key Stage 1 subjects more girls reached the expected standard than boys. The largest difference in attainment by gender was in writing with a gap of 13% between girls (76%) and boys (63%). This reflects the national position.
- In reading the gender gap was 9% with 78% of girls and 69% of boys reaching the standard.
- The gap was narrowest in maths at 4%, where 77% of girls reached the expected standard compared to 73% of boys. Again, this reflects the national picture.
- 58% of children eligible for Pupil Premium funding (69% for those not eligible) reached the expected standard in all three subjects of Reading, Writing and Maths in 2018.
- 14% of children with SEND (75% for those with no SEND) achieved RWM combined.
- 63% of pupils with English as an additional language reached the expected standard in RWM compared to 66% of those with English as a first language.

#### **Key Stage 2**

- In Wolverhampton Reading, Writing and Maths combined attainment was 65% for pupils at the expected standard. This is an increase of 5% on 2017 outcomes and compares to 64% nationally putting Wolverhampton ahead of the Key Stage 2 national figure for the first time. This ranks Wolverhampton 72<sup>nd</sup> nationally compared to 92<sup>nd</sup> in 2017.
- In reading, 77% of pupils achieved the expected standard or above, this is an increase of 7% on 2017 outcomes. Reading in 2018 is 2% above the national figure ranking Wolverhampton 52<sup>nd</sup> nationally compared to 105<sup>th</sup> in 2017. The positive impact of the Local Authority's Reading Project is visible in this data.
- In writing, 81% of pupils were assessed at the expected standard or above. This is a 3% increase on 2017. Writing in 2018 is is 2% above the national average, with Wolverhampton ranked 37<sup>nd</sup> compared to 45<sup>th</sup> in 2017.

- In maths, 76% of pupils achieved the expected standard or above, this is unchanged from 2017, and is the same as the national average, ranking Wolverhampton 73<sup>rd</sup> compared to 60<sup>th</sup> in 2017.
- In Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling 81% of pupils achieved the expected standard or above. This is an increase of 3% on 2017 and was 3% above the national average.
- An increasing proportion of Wolverhampton children are working at the higher standard, or greater depth (GDS): in 2018 this was 27% in reading, 22% in writing, 20% in maths and 36% in GPS, compared to 28%, 20%, 24% and 34% nationally. Overall 9% of pupils in the city attained GDS in reading, writing and mathematics combined compared to 10% nationally.
- The gap between outcomes for boys and girls (RWM combined) is 9%, as 61% of boys achieved the expected standard in all three subjects (this is the same as national) whereas 70% of girls achieved the combined attainment, nationally this was 69%.
- In Reading, Writing and Maths combined, 56% of disadvantaged pupils achieved the expected level (50% in 2017) compared to 51% nationally (48% in 2017). This has been noted by Ofsted as a strength in the city.
- 22% of pupils with SEND achieved this standard compared to 21% nationally, 76% of pupils with no SEND achieved RWM combined compared to 74% nationally.
- 65% of pupils with English as an additional language achieved the expected standard in RWM combined, this was in line with all pupils reaching this level in Wolverhampton. The positive impact of the Local Authority's Citizenship, Language and Learning Team is visible in this data.




 Progress across Key Stage 2 remains significantly above national averages. In reading this is +0.9, in writing +1.2, in maths +0.5 and in GPS +1.6. This is the third successive year that Wolverhampton has achieved significantly above average progress in all Key Stage 2 progress measures.

#### **Revised Key Stage 4**

 Revised outcomes for 2018 indicate that the Progress 8 measure is marginally better than 2017 at -0.05. This improvement is reflected in the ranking for Wolverhampton which is currently 79<sup>th</sup> compared to 82<sup>nd</sup> in 2017. This measure also places Wolverhampton 3<sup>rd</sup> when compared to the statistical neighbours group and 2<sup>nd</sup> regionally.

 The revised average Attainment 8 score per pupil is 44.4 compared to 45 in 2017 and this ranks the city in 114<sup>th</sup> position nationally compared to 96<sup>th</sup> in 2017. • However, this would place the city as 3<sup>rd</sup> in the statistical neighbour group, following Birmingham (45.8) and Sheffield (44.6). Current national data for Attainment 8 is 44.5.

- The proportion of pupils in the city achieving a strong (9-5) pass in English and Maths is 36%, compared to 40% nationally. Despite this slight increase from 2017, this ranks Wolverhampton as 133<sup>rd</sup> position compared to 128<sup>th</sup> in 2017.
- The city is 5<sup>th</sup> in the statistical neighbour group and 5<sup>th</sup> in the West Midlands group.
- The proportion of pupils achieving a standard pass (grades 9-4) in both English and maths has decreased slightly since 2017 and is 57.7% compared to 58% in Wolverhampton last year, and 59.4% nationally for 2018.
- This change leads to 132<sup>nd</sup> position nationally (the same as 2017), although Wolverhampton is above the statistical neighbour average for this measure and is similarly placed 5<sup>th</sup> in the statistical neighbour group, below Coventry (60%), Sheffield (59.8), Birmingham (59.6) and Derby (59.2%).
- The attainment gap between the performance of boys and girls at this measure is significant with 11 percentage points gap for attainment at 9-4 and 12.4 percentage points gap at grades 9-5. Both figures are wider than national and statistical neighbour averages.
- The progress gap is slightly narrower than national levels at 0.46 compared to 0.5.
- Disadvantaged pupils Attainment 8 score was 37.2 compared to 37.9 in 2017 (This was 37.1 nationally in 2017 and 36.8 in 2018).
- It places the city with a national rank of 50, and a place in the second quartile, it places Wolverhampton 2<sup>nd</sup> in comparison to our statistical neighbours. This is considerably higher than the West Midlands Average Attainment 8 score of 36.5
- Disadvantaged pupils performed well at Progress 8 with a score of -0.33, placing Wolverhampton 2<sup>nd</sup> in comparison to our statistical neighbours and West Midlands LAs.
- This amounts to a national ranking of 4, again in the second quartile.
- 23% of disadvantaged pupils achieved a strong pass in English and maths (9-5) compared to 25% nationally; this is the same as the West Midlands at 23%.
- For pupils with SEND support, the Attainment 8 score is 31.8 compared to 32.4 in 2017 (31.9 nationally in 2017, 32.2 in 2018).
- 12% of pupils with SEND achieved a strong pass in English and Maths (9-5) compared to 43% of pupils with no SEND.
- For pupils with SEN Statement/EHCP their Attainment 8 score is 7.7 compared to 8.9 in 2017 (13.9 nationally in 2017, 13.5 in 2018).
- Pupils with English as an additional language had an Attainment 8 score of 47.8 (48.0 nationally and 45.5 for the West Midlands in 2018) compared to 43.4 who speak English as a first language.

- 42% of pupils who have English as an additional language achieved a strong pass in English and Maths (9-5) (44% nationally and 39% for the West Midlands in 2018) compared to 35% who speak English as a first language.
- From 2018, the headline EBacc attainment measure is the EBacc average point score (EBacc APS). Wolverhampton has an EBacc APS of 3.59 ranking 139 nationally and 8<sup>th</sup> in comparison to our statistical neighbours.

- In the EBacc subject areas of English and Maths separately, Wolverhampton has an APS of 4.63 in English ranking 127<sup>th</sup> nationally, places the city 5<sup>th</sup> compared to our regional LAs and 4<sup>th</sup> in comparison to our statistical neighbours.
- In Maths, Wolverhampton has an APS of 4.15 ranking 131<sup>st</sup> nationally, 6<sup>th</sup> compared to our regional LAs and 6<sup>th</sup> in comparison to our statistical neighbours.

#### **Revised Key Stage 5**

- At Key Stage 5, 9.6% of Wolverhampton pupils attained 3+ A\* A or better at A level compared to 13.1% in 2017. This compares to 12.9% nationally and 9.1% for the West Midlands.
- The proportion of pupils achieving AAB or higher at A level in at least 2 facilitating subjects was 13.5% compared to 16.2% nationally and 12.4% in the West Midlands.
- The average points score per entry for A levels was 29.08 compared to 30.71 in 2017. This is 4.25 points below national, ranking Wolverhampton 131st position.
- The gap between the performance of boys and girls at this measure has narrowed this year with a 3.58 point gap compared to 5.85 in 2017.

The average points score per entry for "Technical" qualifications is 24.52 compared to 34.89 in 2017. This is 3.58 points below the national average ranking Wolverhampton in 122<sup>nd</sup> position.
