The local weights and measures authority has "responsible authority" status under the Licensing Act 2003 by virtue of the Licensing Act 2003 (Premises licences and club premises certificates) Regulations 2005.

In December 2012, Trading Standards received a complaint alleging that cigarettes and alcohol were being sold to children from Cameron Convenience.

On 19<sup>th</sup> December 2012, a letter was sent to the Premises Licence Holder, Krunal Gajjar, informing him we had received a complaint about the sale of cigarettes and alcohol from the shop, advising that the sale of such products to persons under eighteen was an offence and giving advice on how to prevent such sales. It was noted that the Designated Premises Supervisor was named on the Premises Licence as Baldeep Singh. (Appendix 2)

On the 6 March 2013, Officers from West Midlands Police, made a routine visit to Cameron Convenience. A Trading Standards Advice pack was handed to a sales assistant (Amina Mohamed) in the shop which included a refusals book and statutory tobacco notice. A 'Responsible Authorities Forum' questionnaire was also completed. Ms Mohamed confirmed she had verbal authorisation to sell alcohol but it was not in writing. There was no premises licence summary on display and she did not know where it was. She was not aware of any proof of age policy. There was no refusals log. Miss Mohamed also said she had not received any training regarding underage sales. The new owner is Angelo Salvo and she thought Baldeep Singh was the previous designated premises supervisor. (Appendix 3)

On 15<sup>th</sup> May 2013, a covert, underage test purchase of alcohol and tobacco was

made at the premises. A bottle of Budweiser beer and 10 Richmond cigarettes were sold to two female volunteers aged 14 and 15. The physical seller was later identified as Angelo Salvo who was in charge of the premises that night and who was subsequently found to be in the process of purchasing the business. He was accompanied by Amina Mohamed. The sale was captured on a covert camera and also witnessed by an officer from Trading Standards. An offence was committed under Section 146(1) of the Licensing Act 2003 of selling alcohol to a person under 18. An offence was also committed under Section 7 of the Children and Young Persons Act 1933 (as amended), of selling tobacco to a person under 18. There was no attempt to ask the volunteers their age or ask for identification. Trading Standards Officers and Police returned to the shop a short while after the sale to talk to the seller but the business had been closed up for the evening.

On the 22<sup>nd</sup> May 2013, a second underage test purchase of alcohol and tobacco was attempted at the premises using the same volunteers aged 14 and 15 as the preceding week. A bottle of VS Vodka and 10 Mayfair cigarettes were sold to the volunteers. The sale was captured on covert camera and witnessed by an officer from Trading Standards. Offences were committed under Section 146(1) of the Licensing Act 2003, of selling alcohol to a child under 18 years of age, and Section 7 of the Children and Young Persons Act 1933 (as amended), for selling tobacco to a child under 18 years of age. The sale was made by Amandeep Kaur who was not an employee but the girlfriend of Angelo Salvo. Also present was Mr Salvo's father, Francesco Salvo, who was in charge of the shop. He was sitting behind the counter drinking a bottle of beer. The volunteers were not asked for identification or had their age challenged in any way. Francesco Salvo said to the volunteers to hide the purchases because they did not look 18. A few minutes later, Trading Standards Officers and Police Officers entered the shop with the purchased goods after the volunteers were taken to safety and notified Mr Salvo and Miss Kaur about the sales. During this time Angelo Salvo arrived at the shop. He confirmed he was in charge but the premises licence was still in the name of Krunal Gajjar.

During this visit, there was no refusals log book. There was no statutory poster on display stating that 'It is illegal to sell tobacco products to anyone under 18', contrary to Section 4 Children and Young persons (Protection from Tobacco) Act 1991. The licence summary was not on display to confirm who the Premises Licence Holder or Designated Premises Supervisor was as required by Section 57(4) of the Licensing Act 2003.

On 11<sup>th</sup> July 2013, Krunal Gajjar was formally interviewed under PACE conditions. He confirmed he was the Premises Licence Holder of Cameron Convenience since 19/11/08. He also believed he was the Designated Premises Supervisor, because Baldeep Singh (the previous owner) had not been involved in the shop since November 2008. Mr Gajjar stated that he had only given verbal training on underage sales to the members of staff in Cameron Convenience and had given written authorisation (dated 21/9/12) to the staff to sell alcohol, which he produced in the interview. He did not know where the licence summary or his premises licence was. He did not know why the statutory tobacco notice was not in place. He confirmed he was trying to sell the shop to Angelo Salvo and was keeping the premises licence in his own name until Angelo Salvo obtained his personal licence. He said he had little involvement with the shop other than this. He was advised to seek advice urgently from the Licensing Service to re-address the issue of who could be the holder of the premises licence and change the designated premises supervisor.

Angelo Salvo was also formally interviewed under PACE conditions. He admitted that he had another full time job in addition to the shop (which he has now resigned from). He had no prior retail experience except for two weeks training from Mr Gajjar when he took over responsibility of the shop. He employed his father, Francesco Salvo to

work 30 hours in the business. Angelo Salvo has subsequently been given a Simple Caution on the 13/11/13, in relation to the offences of selling alcohol and tobacco to a person under 18, (Appendix 4)

On the 26 November 2014 it was discovered from the licensing file that the Designated Premises Supervisor for Cameron Convenience had not been changed, from Baldeep Singh (who had been absent since 2008). Krunal Gajjar was still the Premises Licence Holder yet a copy of correspondence (dated 18/11/13) was held in the file from Mr Gajjar to an external solicitor stating he had not been involved in Cameron Convenience since December 2011, (Appendix 5). Trading Standards contacted Mr Salvo and Mr Gajjar that day and asked why an absent DPS was still on the licence. Mr Salvo was advised not to sell alcohol until he and Mr Gajjar had spoken to the Licensing Service in respect of the validity of the Premises Licence. On the 27 November 2013, the Premises Licence Holder was varied from Mr Gajjar to Angelo Salvo. Mr Gajjar became the Designated Premises Supervisor until Mr Salvo received his personal licence, (Appendix 6).

On the 7 January 2014, Krunal Gajjar pleaded guilty and was prosecuted as a Premises Licence Holder and responsible person in relation to Cameron Convenience, for unlawfully selling alcohol twice in a period of three months to children, contrary to Section 147A(1) and (8) Licensing Act 2003.

Mr Gajjar, as Premises Licence Holder, pleaded guilty not displaying a licence summary in the premises as per Section 57(2) of the Licensing Act 2003.

Mr Gajjar as Premises Licence Holder, pleaded guilty for failing without reasonable excuse to notify the relevant licensing authority, namely Wolverhampton City Council, there was a change of Designated Premises Supervisor as soon as was reasonably practical; contrary to Section 33(1) and (6) of the Licensing Act 2003.

On the 7 January 2014, Francesco Salvo pleaded guilty to and was prosecuted for knowingly allowing a sale of alcohol to a child on the 22 May 2013 contrary to Section 147(1) of the Licensing Act 2003.

Krunal Gajjar had not taken all the actions he could have done to protect children from harm (objective 4). He is still involved in the premises as the Designated Premises Supervisor. The Trading Standards Service therefore wants the attached "Due Diligence Conditions" added to the Premises Licence to reduce the likelihood of underage sales being made.

The Trading Standards Service request that the Licensing Sub Committee give consideration to the attached conditions, (Appendix 1).

**LICENSING ACT 2003 : SALE OF ALCOHOL**  
**DUE DILIGENCE CONDITIONS**

**CAMERON CONVENIENCE**

1. All persons selling alcohol must be trained before they are allowed to sell alcohol to the public. Refresher training must be undertaken at regular intervals. Records must be kept of training by the Designated Premise Supervisor (DPS). Persons selling alcohol must be authorised in writing by the DPS. The records of training and persons authorised to sell alcohol must be kept on the premises during opening hours and must be made available on request to an officer of a Responsible Authority.
2. A 'Challenge 25' and 'No ID NO Sale' policy which is supported with signage at all entrances, where alcohol is displayed and at the till must be implemented, this is the responsibility of the Designated Premises Supervisor..
3. An electronic or written till prompt or a notice must be secured to the till at eye level to remind staff that they must ask for ID if a customer looks under 25.
4. Only documents which include a photograph of the purchaser and their date of birth should be accepted to prove that person's age, e.g. passport, new style driving licence, 'PASS' approved age card e.g. Validate Card or Citizens Card.
5. A 'Refusals Log' must be maintained, which documents the date and time a refusal of sale is made, the reason for the refusal and the member of staff refusing the sale. The DPS must monitor the Log on a regular basis and sign it to show it has been done. The Log must be kept on the premises during opening hours and must be made available on request to an officer of a Responsible Authority.
6. Evidential quality CCTV should be installed and maintained to a high standard, with images/recordings to be kept for 31 days and to be made available upon request to an officer from a responsible authority. At any time there should be at least one member of staff available to download CCTV. CCTV should cover entry and exit points of the premises, areas where alcohol is served and money is taken and all areas to which the public have access.
7. The Designated Premises Supervisor must have responsibility for the day to day management of the sale of alcohol.

Dear Mr Gajjar

**Licensing Act 2003****Children and Young Persons Act 1933 as amended**

Trading Standards has received a complaint that on most weekends children **under** the age of 18 years old have been seen served alcohol and cigarettes in Camerons Convenience 575 Parkfield Road, Wolverhampton. **As you are aware, to sell alcohol and tobacco products to anyone under 18 years of age is a criminal offence.**

There has also been an allegation that a young person under the age of 18 is working behind the counter. If this is correct and they are selling alcohol then they **must** seek permission from an authorised member of staff for **every** individual sale of alcohol they make.

Under the Licensing Act 2003, Section 146, the maximum fine for selling alcohol to a child under 18 years of age is £5000.00. In addition a premises licence could also be reviewed. Selling tobacco to a child attracts a maximum fine of £2500. Wolverhampton City Council and West Midlands Police take such matters very seriously. As a result of this complaint we may make an unannounced supervised child test purchase in the future.

You must always ensure that you and your staff are aware of the responsibilities in selling age restricted products to anyone under age, and that employees as well as the owners of the business could commit offences.

It is now a **mandatory condition for all licensed premises** to ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale **or** supply of alcohol. The policy must require customers who appear to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy ) to produce on request before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark. Breaches of the mandatory conditions could lead to a business losing the Premises Licence; have

additional conditions added to the licence or on summary conviction a maximum of £20,000 fine and/or six months imprisonment.

It is always wise to be vigilant, even when young people look old enough to make such purchases, by asking for identification if the customer looks under **25**. Do not rely on asking for age alone.

**I would urge you to adopt the Challenge 25 principle** if you do not already do so. More information can be found regarding this and on how to ask for identification on the internet at [www.wsta.co.uk](http://www.wsta.co.uk) and [www.noidnosale.com](http://www.noidnosale.com).

The Home Office, Police, Wine and Spirit Trade Association and other major retailer groups are now promoting Challenge 25. This new Campaign is believed to assist retailers who are serious about preventing underage sales of alcohol and hopefully address some situations where adults may purchase alcohol for children. It is **illegal for an adult to buy alcohol on behalf of a person under 18**. If you suspect that an adult is purchasing alcohol to pass on to children you must refuse the sale. The Retail of Alcohol Standards Group has commissioned Challenge 25 posters for retailers to download and display.

It would also be in your best interests to keep a 'Refusals Book'. This would ensure that you can check on staff to see if they are making refusals and if patterns are emerging where more staff are needed at a particular time.

As owners you **must** make sure that an A3 size notice is displayed prominently by the tobacco products stating;

**"IT IS ILLEGAL TO SELL TOBACCO PRODUCTS TO ANYONE UNDER THE AGE OF 18"**

Other notices displayed prominently on your premises are advisable. Suggested warnings could include;

**"IT IS ILLEGAL TO SELL ALCOHOL TO ANYONE UNDER THE AGE OF 18 YEARS",**

**"WE DO NOT SELL ALCOHOL TO UNDER 18'S".**

**"No ID No Sale"**
