Purpose

The purpose of this report is to highlight the educational outcomes of Wolverhampton's children and young people in care and care leavers from September 2021-July 2022, and how these have been supported by the Council, schools and other key partners. It also highlights notable successes as well as future priorities and areas for development.

Background

The Virtual School Head (VSH) for children and young people in care is responsible for ensuring that the local authority effectively discharges its statutory duty, under 22(3A) of the Children Act 1989, to promote the education of children in the care of the local authority (DfE 2014). Due to a range of barriers, the educational outcomes for children and young people in care and care leavers are statistically far poorer than those of their peers. Local authorities seek to narrow this gap through the model of the 'virtual school', with the VSH as the head teacher of that school, working closely in partnership with education settings, social care and other partners and stakeholders.

The report captures key educational outcomes for children and young people in care, and the work that has been done to support these outcomes in line with the above statutory duty. It also outlines the council's response to the wider duties of the VSH, including children previously in care, other children with a social worker and the education, employment and training (EET) of care leavers.

Progress, options, discussion etc.
