a) The local weights and measures authority has "responsible authority" status under the Licensing Act 2003 by virtue of the Licensing Act 2003 (Premises Licences and Club Premises Certificates) Regulations 2005.

b) Family Shop is a trading name of Family Grocery Limited, company registration number 14343517. The registered office is 34 Birchwood Road, Wolverhampton, WV4 5UH. The sole director of the company is Harim Ali ABDULLAH.

c) Harim Ali ABDULLAH is the holder of the Premises Licence for Family Shop. He is also the Designated Premises Supervisor, Personal Licence Number 21/01407/LAPERS issued by Northamptonshire County Council.

d) From December 2022 onwards Wolverhampton Council's Trading Standards Service received complaints alleging that age restricted products were being sold to minors by Family Shop, 34 Birchwood Road, Wolverhampton, WV4 5UH.

e) Consequently, Family Shop was included in an organised underage sales test purchase exercise on 3 July 2023, in which retailers across Wolverhampton were tested in relation to whether they were carrying out required age verification checks and challenging customers who attempted to purchase age restricted products.

f) On 3 July 2023, two 17-year old authorised volunteers, on behalf of the City of Wolverhampton Council, went into the premises of Family Shop together and were sold the following age restricted products without being challenged:

1 x vape namely, Crystal Pro Max Fresh Mint 4000+ puffs

1 x can of REDD's Zurawina at 4.5% ABV with no English language warning

1 x can of REDD's Marakuja at 4.0% ABV

g) The total price of the above products came to £15.50, but the shop assistant, [REDACTED] charged the child volunteers £15 after they told him that was all they had. No attempt was made by the shop assistant to verify the age of the child volunteers or to ask them for any form of identification. It is a mandatory condition under the Licensing Act 2003 that a licenced business operates an Age Verification Policy. The sale was witnessed by a Trading Standards Officer who was in the shop at the time.

h) After leaving the shop, the volunteers handed the age restricted products they had been sold to a Trading Standards Officer, who duly placed them into evidence bags and then sealed the bags.

i) It is a criminal offence under section 146(1) of the Licensing Act 2003 to sell alcohol to a person under the age of 18.

j) It is a criminal offence under the Nicotine Inhaling Products (Age of Sale and Proxy Purchasing) Regulations 2015 to sell nicotine inhaling products, commonly known as e-cigarettes to a person under the age of 18

k) The child volunteers were refused age restricted products at other shops that day.

l) After the sale, a Trading Standards Officer went into the shop to discuss the underage sale that had taken place. The shop assistant contacted the owner of the business, Harim Ali ABDULLAH, who then went to the premises.

- m) At that time the following additional contraventions were also found at the premises:
- n) There was no statutory tobacco notice on display contrary to Section 4 Children and Young Persons (Protection from Tobacco) Act 1991.
- o) There was no refusals book available to inspect.
- p) The cigarette gantry was open, leaving tobacco products on display, contrary to the Tobacco Advertising and Promotion (display) (England) Regulations 2010.
- q) The CCTV was working but Mr ABDULLAH told the Trading Standards Officer that he did not know how to operate it
- r) There was no evidence of any training being provided to staff about age restricted sales legislation in relation to age verification and challenging customers attempting to purchase alcohol.
- s) A trader's notice was issued to Harim Ali ABDULLAH.
- t) Harim Ali ABDULLAH, has engaged in activities which have breached the licensing objectives namely 'the prevention of crime and disorder' and 'the protection of children from harm'.

The Home Office publishes guidance under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003, with the following paragraphs being particularly relevant:

2.22 The protection of children from harm includes the protection of children from moral, psychological and physical harm. This includes not only protecting children from the harms associated directly with alcohol consumption but also wider harms such as exposure to strong language and sexual expletives.

2.23 The Government believes that it is completely unacceptable to sell alcohol to children.

11.27 There is certain criminal activity that may arise in connection with licensed premises which should be treated particularly seriously. This includes the use of the licensed premises for the illegal purchase and consumption of alcohol by minors which impacts on the health, educational attainment, employment prospects and propensity for crime of young people.

The guidance goes on to say that:

11.28Where reviews arise and the licensing authority determines that the crime prevention objective is being undermined through the premises being used to further crimes, it is expected that suspension or revocation of the licence - even in the first instance - should be seriously considered.

With regards to vapes, Part 6 of the Tobacco and Related Products Regulations 2016:

- sets minimum standards for the safety and quality of all e-cigarettes and refill containers (otherwise known as e-liquids)
- ensures that information is provided to consumers so they can make informed choices
- promotes an environment that protects children from starting to use these products

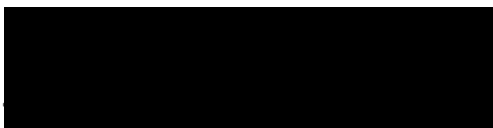
