With breaches of the licensing conditions reported, Public Health is not reassured that the business is operating in adherence to the Licensing Act and therefore supports the Licensing Authority request to review the current licence.

Thank you for your email dated 10th June 2024 regarding the request made by the Licensing Authority to review the premises licence for Chill Wine Bar.

I have reviewed the documentation put forward by Licensing Authority and would support the request to review the premises licence under the licensing objectives of:

- The Prevention of Crime and Disorder
- The Prevention of Public Nuisance

The premises licence holder has failed to comply with the conditions attached to their licence, thus neglecting to uphold the licensing objectives. As a Responsible Authority, we would expect any business licensed to sell alcohol to act responsibly at all times and promote the key objectives of the Licensing Act 2003.

Considering the reported breaches of licensing conditions and failure to promote licensing objectives, this provides no assurance to Public Health that the business is operating in accordance with the Licensing Act. Therefore, Public Health supports the review of the premises license.
